Rev. Strapp is the principal of the Indian Residential School at Brandon, Manitoba, and is a member of the Rotary Club of Brandon.

Presenting new members Presenting new members Max Henning and Jimmy Johnson with their Rotary pins, Rev. Strapp told them that in joining Rotary they were accepting the responsibility to encourage and foster service. He said they were accepting responsibility for a high ethical standard of service in their personal business and semipersonal, business and community life.

Service in Rotary is not just a necessary commodity but a commodity but a necessary part of life, Rev. Strapp told the Rotary Club, in his address. He said that the Rotary motto of service was not of recent origin and referred to John, the blind King of Bohemia, killed in battle by the Back Prince. When his party was found the motto "I Serve" was found with it and adopted by the Black Prince. Since then it has been retained as the
